GENERAL RULES AND REGULATIONS FOR ALL SHOWS AND CONTESTS

1. There is a one time exhibitor fee of \$10 due with initial entry form. Payments may be made by cash or check payable to the Southeastern Youth Fair.
2. It is understood that all exhibitors entering any of the Southeastern Youth Fair shows and/or contests agree to comply with all General Rules and Regulations, Animal Inspections Rules & Regulations and the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics, as well as the rules governing each individual show and/or contest.
3. Let it be known that all those directly associated with the Southeastern Livestock Association/Southeastern Youth Fair, including but not limited to Board Members, Staff, Show Committees, Sponsors, and Volunteers reserve the right to be held harmless and not responsible in any way in case of any damage, fire or accident as to person, lost articles, livestock, etc. entered and/or exhibited or any accidents that might occur to the exhibitor or their family, and/or the general public while visiting on the grounds at any time during the Fair.
4. All animals must be owned by the exhibitor or their immediate family (parents, grandparents, or siblings) or leased. Only heifers, goats and breeding lambs may be leased. The lease agreement must accompany the entry form.
5. All animals must be in the care of the exhibitor by the entry deadline, and remain in their care until the Fair.
6. The Executive Board and/or Show Committee reserve the right to visit exhibitor's locations to inspect animals that have been entered into the Fair.
7. DEFINITION OF A HOMEGROWN ANIMAL: An animal that was born and raised to an animal owned by the exhibitor, their parents or grandparents. If the animal was already bred when purchased, the offspring is NOT homegrown. An embryo transfer is NOT homegrown. The Show Committee's determination as to eligibility shall be conclusive.
8. There will be no overnight camping on the Fair grounds.
9. No dogs are allowed in the barn, except those entered in the Dog Obedience Show. These dogs must be kept within the designated area while waiting to compete and are not allowed beyond the barriers.
10. No parents or family members will be allowed down in the arena during the shows and sales. This area is for exhibitors and show committee members only.
11. No solicitation of buyers is to be done on the Fair grounds during the Fair. This includes, but is not limited to the exhibitor, parent or any other person acting on behalf of the exhibitor, approaching the buyer and directly making the request, or handing out items to buyers or visitors with an exhibitor's name and/or their animal's name or tag number on it. If you choose to present buyers with gifts, please deliver them after the Fair.
12. Exhibitors and parents are not permitted to harass, intimidate, or otherwise act in a rude or angry manner towards any Buyer, Judge, Board, Committee member, or Staff.
13. Rule #4 of the IAFE Code of Show Ring Ethics deals specifically with drugs. Use of drugs, in animals, not in compliance with manufacturer's label as to dosage, time of withdrawal limitations, or other manufacturer's limitations and show regulations is prohibited. The use of tranquilizers or possession of same after arrival at the Fair will be construed as tampering.
14. The Fair will not be responsible for any actions by the US Post Office concerning entries, buyers letters, or thank you letters. This includes letters lost or delayed through the mail.
15. Any protest or complaint must be made in writing within twenty-four (24) hours of the event. It must be addressed to the Chairman and Executive Board of the SEYF, plainly state the complaint, and be delivered to the Fair Office. NO COMPLAINTS ARE TO BE MADE TO THE JUDGE, DIVISION COORDINATOR, OR STAFF.
16. Violation of any rules, misconduct, misrepresentation, or failure to cooperate with the Show Committees or their designees in any manner by either the exhibitor or members of their family, as determined by the SEYF Executive Board, may be cause for disqualification and the exhibitor will forfeit all premiums and awards, and any future participation by the exhibitor at the Southeastern Youth Fair will be prohibited.
17. The Southeastern Livestock Association/Southeastern Youth Fair reserves all rights to make changes to individual shows, events, and/or rules and regulations throughout the year as the Executive Board and/or Show Coordinators deem necessary for the betterment, improvement and safety of exhibitors, volunteers, and guests.
18. STATEMENT OF UNDERSTANDING: By signing and submitting an entry to the 2011 Southeastern Youth Fair, the exhibitor, parents, leaders, and advisors agree that they have read and agree to abide by the Rules and Regulations as published by the Southeastern Livestock Association/Southeastern Youth Fair, and that all information on the entry form is true. By signing the entry form you release the Southeastern Livestock Association/Southeastern Youth Fair and those directly associated with it from any liability to your person or property and you consent to the use, by the Fair, of any pictures taken during the events for promotion or advertising of the Southeastern Youth Fair.
19. For updates and changes to any rules, please visit the website at SEYFair.com.

EXHIBITOR ELIGIBILITY & RESPONSIBILITY

20. Situations may occur which warrant exceptions to both the General Rules and Regulations of the SEYF, or to exhibitor eligibility and responsibility. These exceptions will be addressed on a "case by case" basis. Final resolution to such matters will be that of the SEYF Executive Board.
21. All exhibitors must be a registered member of a chartered Marion County 4-H Club or Marion County FFA/FCCLA Chapter. Their membership must be in good standing and they must meet all their Club or Chapter requirements. In addition, all exhibitors must either live within the boundaries of Marion County and/or attend a Marion County school.
22. The division between Junior, Intermediate, and Senior classes shall be uniform throughout the Fair. The age for all shows is as of September 1, 2010. Juniors: 8 - 11 years, Intermediate: 12 - 15 years, Seniors: 16 years and older. PLEASE NOTE: 4-H members under the age of 8 (as of September 1, 2010) may not compete for any awards and/or prizes. They may enter only those events specific to their age group (5 to 7 years old).
23. The exhibitor must declare, on each entry, whether they are entering as a 4-H or FFA/FCCLA member. Once that designation is made, it will not be changed. No 4-H member will be allowed to transfer exhibits or animals to another Club once the entry is received.

24. DRESS CODE: It is preferred that exhibitors wear appropriate, neat clothing that reflects the official 4-H or FFA/FCCLA uniform. If worn, jeans should be neat and clean with no holes, however, slacks or khakis are preferred. The Division Coordinator shall make the final decision regarding appropriateness of dress.
25. Feed, care and management of animals, excluding those animals in the small animal barn, shall be the responsibility of the exhibitor.
26. Each exhibitor is required to maintain a clean and attractive area (stall or cage) at all times. Shavings will be provided for bedding. Straw bedding is not allowed.
27. Do not dump trash in the shavings bin.
28. Upon departure, if your stall is red-tagged for any items left behind (equipment, tools, drink containers, stall tags, trash, etc.) you will be fined \$25.00.
29. There will be no electrical equipment allowed in the wash rack area. This includes, but is not limited to blow dryers and clippers. Anyone found violating this rule will be immediately dismissed from the show.
30. Each exhibitor will provide their own markers and safety pins. There will be a limit of 1 stall card and 2 back tags provided.
31. It is requested that all exhibitors send a "Thank You" letter to the Division Coordinators and sponsors for each event they participate. Without these volunteers and sponsors, the Fair could not continue. These letters do not need to come to the Fair office – send them directly to the recipient. For rules on thank you letters to buyers see #61 - #65.

ENTRIES

32. Mail entries to: Southeastern Youth Fair, PO Box 404, Ocala, FL 34478. All entries must be postmarked by November 19, 2010.
33. You may deliver entries to the Fair office at 2232 NE Jacksonville Road. DO NOT DELIVER THEM TO EITHER THE 4-H OFFICE, THE EXTENSION OFFICE OR THE LIVESTOCK PAVILION OFFICE (see map of facility). The Fair has a blue locked mailbox on the back porch (at the top of the ramp). If the office is closed, please leave entries in the mailbox – before November 19.
34. NO FAXED ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED.
35. All entries must be filled out completely and accurately. Entries are verified for eligibility and accuracy. Any incomplete or inaccurate entries will not be accepted and will be returned to either the 4-H Leader or the FFA Advisor of the exhibitor.
36. Exhibitors will only be allowed to enter either a steer or a hog. An individual may enter his or her own steer or hog and also show a club or chapter steer or hog.
37. Clubs and Chapters may enter and show both a steer and hog.
38. The Executive Board and/or Show Coordinators reserve the right to review any entry, and may, by majority vote, reject any animal from the show and/or sale, if it is deemed in the best interest of the overall show and/or sale.

RECORD BOOKS

39. All exhibitors showing an animal must keep and complete either the "Market Animal" or "Animal" Southeastern Youth Fair Record Book. These books will be available from the Fair Office, your 4-H Leader, or your FFA Advisor after all entries have been received. They may also be found on the website and downloaded.
40. A record book is required for each animal show the exhibitor is entered in. It is to be done by the exhibitor and not an adult. Only one record book may be submitted per show. If more than one is submitted by the exhibitor, no book for that exhibitor will be judged for that show.
41. Beginning dates for animal projects are as follows: Steers – initial weigh-in; Market Lambs – pick-up day; Hogs – tagging day; all other animals begin their projects on November 19.
42. Record books must be complete by check-in the day of the show. The only exception is the "Financial Summary" page in the Market Animal book which cannot be complete until the final weigh-in.
43. All pages to the record book must be secured. No paperclips will be allowed. Duo-tang folders are allowed, but the book must be attached with the clips, not just placed in the pocket.
44. **IF YOUR ANIMAL DOES NOT MAKE THE SHOW** you may still submit your completed record book for judging.
45. All record books will be judged by the same standards
Completeness: 25 points Accuracy: 25 points Neatness: 20 points Evidence of work: 30 points
46. Only those record books earning a Blue Ribbon will be considered for any awards or premiums.

ANIMAL INSPECTIONS

47. All animals shall enter the show grounds through the west gate. The exceptions are dogs, chickens and rabbits.
48. All goats and sheep must have a scrapie ID number.
49. All health rules as outlined by the Florida Department of Agriculture, Division of Animal Industry as printed in this book must be adhered to. State inspectors will be on the grounds to verify health papers and check in all animals. No animals will be unloaded without the inspector's approval.
50. The State Inspector has the right to test any animal on the facility without prior notice.

JUDGING CRITERIA

51. Judges for animal shows and showmanship classes must not reside in Marion County.
52. No judge can be repeated for the same show more than two (2) times in a four (4) year period.
53. No Division Coordinator will judge any aspect of the Fair.
54. Sellers of animals in a show are not allowed to judge that show.
55. Division Coordinators reserve the right to withhold any award due to limited numbers of competition, the quality of the exhibit being below an acceptable standard, or poor scoring in a contest.
56. Herdsman judging will take place throughout the time the animals are on exhibit. Ten (10) points will be awarded for each of the following: appearance and cleanliness of the animal; cleanliness and attractiveness of the stall; exhibitor's attitude, appearance and knowledge; condition of equipment; safety practices used; added extras.
57. JUDGES' DECISIONS ARE FINAL.

MARKET ANIMALS

In addition to all other rules, the following also apply to the Steer, Market Lamb, and Hog shows:

Before the Fair:

58. **All exhibitors entering the Steer, Swine and Market Lamb shows must write letters to prospective buyers. While you are encouraged to write more, you are required to write a minimum of five (5) prospective buyers. Three (3) letters must be made to new buyers and two (2) letters to former (last year's) buyers.**
59. Use the following guideline: 1) Introduce yourself. 2) Invite them to the Fair to support the youth of Marion County. 3) Tell about your project and ask them to consider bidding or purchasing your animal. REMEMBER: The more buyers, the better the prices.

At the Fair:

60. Make sure you pick up your copy of the buyer's agreement on the night of the sale. It will contain the name and address of your buyer. A box will be placed at the window of the sale's office during the auction and your paper will be located there. For the swine sale, you will be told at the mandatory meeting where this will be located. IT IS YOUR RESPONSIBILITY TO PICK UP YOUR COPY – EVEN IF YOUR ANIMAL IS THE LAST ONE SOLD.

After the Fair:

61. **An original "Thank You" letter to your buyer must be received in the Fair office no later than March 31, 2011. Do not send a copy. Mail entries to: Southeastern Youth Fair, PO Box 404, Ocala, FL 34478. A postmark date is acceptable.**
62. You may deliver entries to the Fair office at 2232 NE Jacksonville Road. DO NOT DELIVER THEM TO EITHER THE 4-H OFFICE OR THE EXTENSION OFFICE. The Fair has a blue locked mailbox on the porch (at the top of the ramp). If the office is closed, please leave letters in either location by March 31.
63. **AT THE MINIMUM:** All letters must include a total of nine (9) sentences. The following is a suggested guideline: Paragraph 1 – introduce yourself (name, age, school, club or chapter, how many years showing, etc.). Paragraph 2 – tell what the project is (steer, lamb, hog) and describe what you learned from the project. Do not just say "I learned responsibility" or "I learned time management." Explain how you learned it and why it is important. Paragraph 3 – Express your appreciation (Remember that anything earned over the market price is a gift from your buyer, so thank them accordingly.) Tell them how you plan on using this gift. Make sure you sign it.
64. Letters that do not meet the minimum 9 sentence requirement will be returned to the exhibitor to be re-written.
65. Exhibitors will not be paid until your "Thank You" letter is received and approved and payment from the buyer is received. The Fair invoices buyers immediately, but some buyer's checks come from out of the county or state. It may take 2 to 3 months before you will receive your check.
66. A commission of 4% for steers, 5% for hogs, and 3% for lambs will be retained by the SEYF to help defray expenses.
67. The state Beef and Swine standard check-off fees and National Lamb Board check-off fee will also be deducted from the sale check.

INTERNATIONAL ASSOCIATION OF FAIRS AND EXPOSITIONS NATIONAL CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

Exhibitors of animals at livestock shows shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity to promote the advancement of agricultural education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors who compete in structured classes of competition. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show. In addition to the "IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics," fairs and livestock shows may have rules and regulations which they impose on the local, county, state, provincial and national levels. All youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows. Exhibitors who violate this code of ethics demean the integrity of all livestock exhibitors and should be prohibited from competition at all livestock shows in the United States and Canada. The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1.** All exhibitors must present, upon request of fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2.** Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers, or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3.** Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at fairs or livestock shows.
- 4.** Animals shall be presented to show events where they will enter the food chain free of drugs. The act of entering an animal in a livestock show is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer and/or absolutely responsible person for show management to obtain any specimens of urine, saliva, blood, or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. Animals not entered in an event which culminates with the animal entering the food chain shall not be administered drugs other than in accordance with applicable federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules. Livestock shall not be exhibited if the drugs administered in accordance with federal, state and provincial statutes, regulations and rules affect the animal's performance or appearance at the event. If the laboratory report on the chemical analysis of saliva, urine, blood, or other sample taken from livestock indicates the presence of forbidden drugs or medication, this shall be prima facie evidence such substance has been administered to the animal either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample or urine, saliva, blood, or other substance tested by the approved laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken with the burden on the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to prove otherwise at any hearing in regard to the matter conducted by the fair or livestock show. At any time after an animal arrives on the fair or livestock show premises, all treatments involving the use of drugs and/or medications shall be administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- 5.** Any surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or irritant substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6.** The use of showing and/or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7.** Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during, or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8.** No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action.
- 9.** The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10.** The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person to have any disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show. The act of entering an animal is the giving consent that any proceedings or disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show may be published with the name of the violator or violators in any publication of the International Association of Fairs and Expositions, including *Fairs and Expositions* and any special notices to members.
- 11.** The act of entering of an animal in a fair or livestock show is the giving of verification by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer, or absolutely responsible person that he or she has read the IAFE National Code of Show Ring Ethics and understands the consequences of and penalties provided for actions prohibited by the code. It is further a consent that any action which contravenes these rules and is also in violation of federal, state, or provincial statutes, regulations, or rules may be released to appropriate law enforcement authorities with jurisdiction over such infractions.

**CHAPTER 5C-4 - ADMISSION OF ANIMALS FOR EXHIBITION
AS REQUIRED BY THE FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE AND CONSUMER
SERVICES**

5C-4.001 General Requirements and Limitations

- (1) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI) Required. All animals for exhibition in Florida, unless specifically exempted, must be accompanied by an OCVI issued by a veterinarian accredited in the state of origin.
 - (a) The OCVI must be complete including the breed, name and registration number, and permanent identification such as tattoo, ear tag number, microchip number, or brand.
 - (b) Results of a specific test requirement or herd certification or validation number for each animal must be recorded on the OCVI with the date of the test or herd certification or validation.
- (2) For exhibition purposes only, an OCVI is valid for 90 days from the date of issue; or until the expiration date of any required tests, whichever is the earliest date. For importation into the State, the OCVI is valid for 30 days pursuant to Rule 5C-3.002(1)(c).
- (3) Exemption to Required OCVI. An OCVI is not required for animals originating in the state of Florida and entered in market classes provided that the animals are segregated from other animals and only the animals in a market class occupy the pens. Pens used for market class must not be reused until after cleaning and disinfecting.
- (4) Prior to acceptance at an exhibition, all animals presented for exhibition must be visually inspected by a veterinarian licensed in the State of Florida, or by a Department representative for:
 - (a) The required identification of animal;
 - (b) Clinical signs of disease; and
 - (c) Evidence of compliance with test requirements
- (5) Any animal, which has clinical signs of contagious or infectious disease on visual inspection, or any animal, which is known to be exposed, must be:
 - (a) Withdrawn from exhibition and returned to the place of origin, or
 - (b) Examined at the owner's expense within 24 hours by a veterinarian licensed in the state of Florida who certifies by a signed written statement that the animal is free of contagious of infectious disease.

5C-4.0015 Definition

For the purpose of this Chapter the following definitions shall apply:

- (1) Accredited Veterinarian. A licensed veterinarian who has been approved to perform certain functions of the federal and cooperative federal-state programs by the Deputy Administrator, United States Department of Agriculture, Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service, Veterinary Services, in accordance with the provisions of 9CFR 161(1993).
- (2) Animal(s). This term shall include:
 - (a) Livestock including grazing animals, such as cattle, horses, sheep, swine, goats and other hoofed animals;
 - (b) Ratites, limited to ostriches, emus and rheas;
 - (c) Domesticated fowl, which are propagated or maintained for commercial, exhibition, or breeding purposes, or as pets; and
 - (d) Wild or game animals which may threaten the agricultural interests of the state.
- (3) Department Representative. An employee of the Department who is authorized to perform animal health regulatory activities regarding the prevention, control, and eradication of certain infectious or communicable diseases of animals.
- (4) Exhibition. An assembly of animals for the purpose of competition or public presentation including but not limited to fairs shows, and rodeo events.
- (5) Group. One or more animals maintained on the same premises or in contact.
- (6) Horse. Any horse, mule, ass, zebra, or other equine.
- (7) Isolation. Separation of individual animals by a physical barrier in a manner that assures one animal does not have access to the body, excrement, or discharges of another animal; does not share a building with a common ventilation system; and is not within ten feet of another animal.

- (8) Market Class. An exhibition class consisting of finished fed animals where all animals in the class go directly to slaughter immediately following the exhibition.
- (9) Official Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (OCVI). An official form approved by the senior animal health official of the state of origin or an equivalent form from the USDA, which is a complete and legible certificate issued by a veterinarian who is licensed and accredited in the state of origin.
- (10) Official Test. A test conducted by a method approved by Department rules for the specific disease and animal species.
- (11) Segregated. The maintenance of one group of animals so as to prevent physical contact with another group of animals.
- (12) Materials. Title 9 C.F.R.161 (1994) is hereby incorporated by reference. Copies may be obtained from the United States Government Printing Office, Superintendent of Documents, Mail Stop SSOP, Washington, D.C. 20402-9328.

5C-4.002 Cattle

- 1) OCVI Required. Cattle for exhibition must be accompanied by an OCVI dated not more than 90 days prior to presentation and must be accompanied by evidence of completion of the test requirements or certifications listed in 5C-4.002(2).
- 2) Test or Certification Required.
 - (a) Tuberculosis
 - 1. Cattle may be entered for exhibition without a tuberculin test provided the OCVI identifies the cattle as originating from a Tuberculosis-Free State as defined in rule 5C-7.016(3), Florida Administrative Code, and Accredited Tuberculosis-Free Herd, as defined in rule 5C-7.016(1), Florida Administrative Code, or a herd not under quarantine in a Modified Accredited Tuberculosis State, as defined in rule 5C-7.016(23), Florida Administrative Code. When accredited, the heard accreditation number must be recorded on the OCVI.
 - 2. Other cattle may be entered for exhibition provided the cattle originate from a herd not under quarantine and have a negative tuberculin test within 30 days prior to the date of the exhibition.
 - 3. A positive test on any animal in a designated group disqualifies all animals of the group from exhibition.
 - (b) Brucellosis.
 - 1. Vaccination Required. All female dairy cattle four months of age or older born after January 1, 1984 must be officially calfhood vaccinated.
 - 2. No Test Required

5C-4.005 Goats or Sheep

Identification: Sexually intact sheep and goats must be tagged in conformity with the National Scrapie Eradication Uniform Methods and Rules. Only USDA-provided or -approved tags shall be used. USDA-provided tags will either have a unique alphanumeric sequence or a premise number and a production (animal) number within a flock, or a premises number and a unique alphanumeric sequence. A USDA-approved identification may include either an official USDA eartag, a legible breed registration tattoo accompanied by the registration certificate, or a microchip if the animal originates from a flock enrolled in the voluntary Scrapie Certification Program and the flock owner with a microchip reader accompanies the animal(s).
